2019, and The Pyjama Foundation celebrates 15 years.

Once again time for reflection. From our humble beginnings operating The Pyjama Foundation from my dining room table in 2004, we have travelled a remarkable journey. Starting the organisation with only limited assets, but a strong vision has led to our success. My stand was to empower the children in care with education and bring some fun, joy and an abundance of books into their lives. I knew if we could implement this vision, it would have to make a difference in the fractured lives and educational future for this unique pool of children in out of home care.

15 years has witnessed The Pyjama Foundation attract 8500 new and dedicated Pyjama Angels to be trained and empowered and to sprinkle some magic on children who are desperately needing positive connections. The children are loving our program and are making comments such as: My Pyjama Angel is very nice, smart and funny, not bossy, and fun to hang out with. I feel safe and I like her very much. Or, My Pyjama Angel is a good friend. My Pyjama Angel helps me work towards a better future, she helps me understand things, she tells me how good I am, when I am grumpy, she tells me to take big breaths and helps me calm down. I love my Pyjama Angel.

So how does this equation work! The Pyjama Foundation has committed and enthusiastic volunteers, who are compelled to make a difference. Add some children who are eager for connections, then insert into the mix, characters like Hairy Maclary, Spot the Dog, The Hungry Caterpillar, Matilda, The Wide Mouth Frog, Baby Wombat, Cat in the hat, and the result is togetherness and the educational value of being read to. A young person receiving the warmth and care of a trusted adult.

Mem Fox, in 2005, in a letter of support said to us, "The work of The Pyjama Foundation is particularly exciting since in their program the bonding with an adult will happen at the same time as children bond with a particular book, which they will want to hear over and over again. In turn developing the ability to read and write."

Sometimes it is not easy for our volunteers. They need to be brave and they often wear their heart on their sleeve. But the benefits to our volunteers are what makes them come back each week. To see the progress of the children, to see their smiling faces, to have them waiting at the door for you, to see them have successes, is heartwarming and it is contagious.

Billy loves to read with me, Every visit I take new books and he loves them. He thrives on one on one time. We have a wonderful time together.

In 15 years, we have read aloud millions of books, we have introduced animals, places in the world, wizards, magic, characters, super heroes, rhymes, songs, humor, jokes and poetry. We have turned nonreaders into readers and shared with the children our love of books.

According to research, reading frequently does actually make you smarter. Not only does it help you retain knowledge, but it helps you remember knowledge later in life. It is always fabulous to be reminded about the benefits of reading. Reading can help with any stress or turmoil in your life. Children who read often and widely get better at it. Reading exercises our brain. It improves our concentration. Reading teaches children about the world around them. Reading improves vocabulary and language skills. Reading develops a child's imagination. Reading helps children to develop empathy. But most of all reading is fun. We all have an invaluable part to play in ensuring the young people in our lives fall in love with books. It is a gift they will cherish forever. Children are soothed by a calm voice. Hearing the rhythm of words and the expression in voices builds a rich and diverse network of language for their developing brains. The key here is exposure.

The more you read aloud to your child, the more words they will be exposed to and the more solid their foundation for future literacy skills will be. Exposing them to gorgeous illustrations, exquisite writing and the joy of story is the best way to help them fall in love with books. A level of literacy is important in successfully navigating life and becoming an informed, active and contributing member of society.

To sum up our Program, we recently received this note from one of our foster carers: "I am writing this as I would like to say that our Pyjama Angel is the best thing to happen for our family. Not only has she helped my child in all aspects of her schooling, but a beautiful listener for me. What a beautiful thing to do fur us, and my child and I love her to death. Thank you from the bottom of my heart".

Thank you to all our supporters, funders, staff, volunteers and children. Together we can change the world one child at a time.

The Pyjama Foundation's mission: Creating positive relationships for every Australian child in care, empowering them with learning, life skills and confidence, is still our focus after 15 years of doing just that.

Our wonderful Pyjama Angels are bringing joy into Australian homes every week and Carers and Child Safety workers are amazed at the change in confidence and empowerment that they witness in the children.

However, the 15 years have taught us that our program works best and lasts longest if our Pyjama Angels feel connected to the larger organisation and are aware of what we are achieving nationally.

Bronwyn, creator of the Pyjama Foundation, often refers to the organisation as The Pyjama Family. So, our "Mission" of creating positive relationships, applies to every member of The Pyjama Family.

Research Project with QUT

Dr Ruth Knight from QUT's Australian Centre for Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies is leading the research project we are undertaking to gain evidence about the outcomes of the Love of Learning Program.

The project began by undertaking a literature review (available here*) to identify the key risk and protective factors for children in OOHC experiencing educational disadvantage. The review describes evidence-based interventions that improve educational outcomes for children and young people in OOHC in Australia and overseas. This review helped us gain confidence that our program at The Pyjama Foundation aligns with best practice.

In the words of Dr Knight, "As a researcher at The Australian Centre for Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies (ACPNS), I would like to acknowledge the social impact being created by The Pyjama Foundation and commend them for their work empowering vulnerable children to learn life skills and confidence."

"The Pyjama Foundation attracts a high quality of volunteers, who are well trained and supported. These volunteers are committed to achieving best practice and establishing a long-term connection with young people at risk of exclusion and isolation. The work of The Pyjama Foundation is well regarded in our community for its evidence-based positive contribution to improving the lives of Queensland's children and young people in care."

Currently, the research project is gaining feedback from children in The Love of Learning Program, and assessing the key components of our program. Once we have validated the feedback process we intend to roll this out so that all children in our program can give us regular feedback about the outcomes being achieved. This means we can regularly report to our supporters and funders, and continue to improve our support for Pyjama Angels, and the educational outcomes for children in the program.

Thank you to all the individuals, Angels, Foster Carers and children who have been involved the research project so far, and those assisting us to gain valuable feedback from children in the program. Please stay tuned, we will be updating everyone about the results of the research project very soon.

Meet Pyjama Angel Joel

Juggling work, family, friends and personal hobbies means most of us have very busy schedules. Joel was not an exception to this rule, with a very busy work-life as well as a very healthy social life. Amongst balancing all of that, he knew he needed to do something bigger than himself.

"I wanted to do something a bit selfless with my time because we all get caught up with our work and our own personal stuff, but you've got to give a little sometimes to balance your life out," he said.

Joel was assigned to 11-year-old T* who he quickly discovered was a reserved and quiet young man who struggled with trust and letting new people in.

"He's a bright young kid and he was pretty quiet for the first few months I started seeing him, but he slowly came out of his shell. Their learning gets altered so much by what's happening in their home and I saw that when I first started with T*.

"He couldn't spell basic words, although his math was really good; I think he's got one of those minds. It has improved so much in the last 18 months that I've been with him which is really good to see. His self-esteem has grown too."

"As C's caseworker I've had a unique perspective to witness the people who have truly had significant positive impacts in C's life. Julian came along in C's life at a very tumultuous time, he has always persevered with patience and compassion.

C starts to describe the huge list of activities that Julian has engaged in with C at a time when there was no one else to step up. Apart from being a mentor, a teacher, a role model, he was a friend. A friend who, despite navigating through troubled waters, has always maintained a positive outlook, and more importantly, a real belief in C's potential to become the best man he can be.

It's not difficult for C to remember fondly, Julian's generosity and outgoing personality which has given C so many opportunities to experience things he would have otherwise never been able to. A smile creeps across C's face as he launches into stories of Julian taking him to thebeach, sailing, bike riding, bush walks, rock climbing, indoor skydiving, helping him with school work, and just being there for him whenever he needed.

Finding someone who is so wholeheartedly committed to helping vulnerable young people is extremely rare and to have someone who can maintain this level of devotion and longevity is almost unheard of."

Before this long-term placement, Alisa spent 9 months with a young girl in 2015 before being kind enough to take on a temporary one-month placement in early 2016 while another Pyjama Angel was away. After this, she was placed in the home she would continue with a lovely boy – then aged 9 – in need of some support with his homework. All these years later, the pair are still going strong, despite her young cherub entering his teens and starting high school. The child's carer said Alisa has not only formed a beautiful friendship with the child she supports but also the carer who says he feels "blessed" to have her in their life.

Sandy has been an amazing support for three siblings living together in care, acting as a friend and positive adult role model since 2013. Their carer appreciates the reinforcement and the extra hand, helping all of the children in the home reach their full potential. In her own words, she said: "Sandy has made things easier because she gives the kids something I can't give them. They have known her for so long now that she has become part of the family. I'm the disciplinarian whereas Sandy has a very different role so she can talk to the kids and say things I can't. She spends individual time with them and it's that personal interaction that I don't get to do as a carer."


BRISBANE

This year marked The Pyjama Foundation's 15th year of operation. To celebrate, the 2019 Big Dreams Gala Ball was the perfect opportunity to reflect on the Foundation's key milestones achieved throughout the years, including mentoring more than 8,500 children and reading more than 2.5 million books to kids in care. The night was simply magical filled with incredible live entertainment, memorable speeches from Tim (a Love of Learning Program recipient of over 10 years), and so many different fundraising opportunities including live auction, silent auction, raffle tickets and mystery envelopes.

The room was filled with the Foundation's greatest supporters from Child Safety Officers, Government officials, through to our long-term volunteer Pyjama Angels. The evening raised more than \$46,000 for the Love of Learning Program - allowing us to impact the lives of even more children living in out-of-home care. Thank you to all the businesses who supported our event through in-kind donations - the night simply wouldn't have been what it was without their phenomenal support.



During the month of March we hosted our Battle of the Brains Trivia Night in 10 different locations. Battle of the Brains Pyjama Trivia Night is all about coming together with your friends, family and colleagues to go head to head with other teams to see which team is the smartest – taking out the title of 'Trivia Champion'! It was also about raising funds for our Love of Learning Program. Participants were encouraged to don their pyjamas or onesies, while battling against other teams in different categories including general knowledge, fun facts, music, movies and sports. Our Trivia Night campaign raised \$42,000 in total for our Love of Learning Program.

"My name is T* and I would like to talk about my experience with having the Pyjama Foundation in my life supporting me for so many years and encouraging me to be the best person I can be.

I came into care at 18 months old. My sister who I have been with most of my cared for years said I had 27 placements before I came to live where I have been since I was 7 years of age and I have been here for 11 years and I am not going anywhere.

I remember my early years of learning and not being happy so I didn't want to learn and was suspended from school a few times and I had the school in lockdown twice, I would throw chairs through the windows and just had bad behaviours. I didn't get a report card until grade 4 because they said I couldn't be assessed as I was sent out of class and put into an isolated room with a computer and I used to send my carer emails through the day just asking her what she was doing and what was she making for dinner.

I was really lucky to join The Pyjama Foundation and got a really great Pyjama Angel named Julie who is a Journalist, so she is really smart and really interested in what I do. She has been my Angel for 10 years

When she first came to visit, I was really scared because I had so many adults giving me a hard time. I remember saying things to her that were horrible but I didn't know how to talk to people so she was really kind and if I said something not nice she would repeat it in a really nice way and she became my first real friend. And she is still one of my closest friends today.

When I first met Julie, I couldn't read and was in the Special Education Unit. I felt I would never make it to Graduation or be able to be independent but when I started High school I had learnt so much I was mainstream schooled and completed senior, I had an amazing Graduation and my Angel Julie came to see me which was fantastic and she cried when I actually graduated. She was amazing with all the help with my assignment and homework she helped me with. I owe her so much for everything but she said she is so proud of me.

I am proud of the person I have become and I am so grateful to The Pyjama Foundation."

Kathy spoke with so much conviction and emotion as she relayed her experiences of being a foster carer, the trials and tribulations that come along with it.

So why did we go into fostering? At the beginning, it was because we had struggled with infertility but we didn't want to let that stand in the way of having a family. But really, there is one overarching reason why we became foster carers and I think this may be true for most foster carers:

It's because our reasons to say yes were so much bigger than the reasons to say no.

You don't need to be perfect or a saint to be a good foster carer. We really are just an ordinary family. I am certainly far from saintly and far from perfect but I know I am a good carer and a good mum. Despite my many faults, what makes me a good carer is that even on my very worst days, my kids have the most important things they need: they know they are loved and they know they are safe. What makes a good carer is a great capacity for love. A willingness to understand why kids with trauma behave the way they do and willingness to parent them the way they need, not the way others may think they deserve.



A good carer has a great tolerance of failure. And most of all, a good carer must be willing to risk a huge amount of heartbreak, more than you think possible. Foster carers love the starfish story. If you don't know it, it's the story of hundreds and hundreds of starfish washed up on a beach, and a young boy walking along picking them up and gently throwing them straight back into the sea. A man walked up to the young boy and asked him what he was doing. The boy tells him he is throwing the starfish back into the ocean, otherwise they'll die. The man laughs and says there are miles and miles of beach and hundreds of starfish. That the boy won't make any difference. The boy listens politely, then bends down and picks up another starfish and throws it into the surf. He smiles at the man and says...

I made a difference to that one...

This is what foster carers do and this is what Pyjama Angels do. We change the world for one child at a time, and that makes a world of difference. When we first contacted the Pyjama Foundation my son B*was 6 years old – he is now 11. He loves science, computers, cooking and sewing. He is funny. He is cheeky. He loves to dress up. He is my loving, quirky, loud, special boy. And I have been his proud mum since he was 9 months old. I saw the Pyjama Foundation as a way to help him feel special. To get more of the individual attention he needed, with the added bonus of helping a child who doesn't like reading and wasn't doing well at school.

I contacted the Foundation and the support we needed came through quickly. There was no question that asking for help meant that we were not coping. Just a genuine desire from everyone at The Pyjama Foundation to help my child as quickly as possible. They talked the talk, and they walked the walk. Not long after the paperwork was completed I had a call about a Pyjama Angel, Meg.

I didn't know much about Meg. I knew Meg didn't know much about us. But you know what? That didn't matter. All that mattered is that my child needed help and Meg was willing to help him. Regardless of the grief and trauma consuming our family, B* had the predictable calm each week of Meg coming in.taught him to persist. B* has learnt that, yes, schoolwork is often hard and daunting but he can keep trying. He is learning to ask for help and that when he asks for help, it will be given. Working with Meg has undoubtedly helped to increase his academic confidence and then his engagement and behaviour at school.

It's not knowing if everyone you love will remember your birthday, but being surprised by a beautiful birthday card and book, of course, sent by the Pyjama Foundation. It's all these things that might seem small to us, but to these small, wonderful kids it means so much.

I see you. You matter. I am here for you.





The financial report covers The Pyjama Foundation as an individual entity. The Pyjama Foundation is a not- for-profit Company, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The principal activities of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2019 was to provide children in foster care the opportunity to change the direction of their lives with learning, life skills and confidence.

The functional and presentation currency of The Pyjama Foundation is Australian dollars. The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on 24th October 2019.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.

2 Change in Accounting Policy

The company has adopted all the amendments to the Australia Accounting Standards issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board, which are relevant to and effective for the Company's financial statements for the annual period beginning 1 July 2018.

Financial Instruments - Adoption of AASB 9

The Company has adopted AASB 9 *Financial Instruments* for the first time in the current year with a date of initial adoption of July 1, 2018.

As part of the adoption of AASB 9, the Company adopted consequential amendments to other accounting standards arising from the issue of AASB 9 as follows:

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements requires the impairment of financial assets to be presented in a separate line item in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income. In the comparative year, this information was presented as part of other expenses.
- AASB 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures requires amended disclosures due to changes arising from AASB 9, this disclosures have been provided for the current year.

The key changes to the Company's accounting policy and the impact on these financial statements from applying AASB 9 are described below.

Changes in accounting policies resulting from the adoption of AASB 9 have been applied retrospectively except the Company has not restated any amounts relating to classification and measurement requirements including impairment which have been applied from July 1, 2018.

Classification of financial assets

The financial assets of the Company have been reclassified into those measured at amortised cost on adoption of AASB 9 based on primarily the business model in which a financial asset is managed and its contractual cash flow characteristics.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

2. Change in Accounting Policy (Cont.)

Impairment of financial assets

The incurred loss model from AASB 139 has been replaced with an expected credit loss model in AASB 9 for assets measured at amortised cost, contract assets and fair value through other comprehensive income.

Financial instruments

For current year

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial Assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Company classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at amortised cost:

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Company's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income, foreign exchange gains or losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

2. Change in Accounting Policy (Cont.)

Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for the following assets:

financial assets measured at amortised cost

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial assets has increased significant since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Company considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Company's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Company uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Company uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

- the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Company in full, without recourse to the Company to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial assets is more than 90 days past due.

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Company has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Company renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost are determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9. On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

2. Change in Accounting Policy (Cont.)

Financial liabilities

The Company measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs, subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

The financial liabilities of the Company comprise trade payables, bank and other loans and finance lease liabilities.

For comparative year

Financial instruments are recognised initially using trade date accounting, i.e. on the date that the Company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

Financial assets are divided into the following category which are described in detail below:

loans and receivables;

Financial assets are assigned to the different categories on initial recognition, depending on the characteristics of the instrument and its purpose. A financial instrument's category is relevant to the way it is measured and whether any resulting income and expenses are recognised in profit or loss or in other comprehensive income.

All income and expenses relating to financial assets are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income in the 'finance income' or 'finance costs' line item respectively.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise principally through the provision of goods and services to customers but also incorporate other types of contractual monetary assets.

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The Company's trade and other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

None of the amendments have had a significant impact on the Company.

3 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The Company is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Leases

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

(c) Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Company and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Grant Revenue

Grant Revenue is recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss when the entity obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

When grant revenue is received whereby the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

The Pyjama Foundation recognises if received, non-reciprocal contribution of assets from the government and other parties for zero or a nominal value. These assets are recognised at fair value on the date of acquisition in the statement of financial position, with a corresponding amount of income recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Company is entitled to it.

3. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Cont.)

(d) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

(f) Plant and Equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair values as indicated, less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present/values in determining recoverable amounts.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost are valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset as the date it is acquired.

The capitalisation limit of all plant and equipment is \$5,000, all assets below that threshold are expensed immediately in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Depreciation

Equipment is depreciated on a straight -line basis over the asset's useful life to the company, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

3. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Cont.) Plant and Equipment (Cont.)

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

(g) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair amount less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the entity would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is determined as the depreciated replacement cost of an asset.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

(h) Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from donors and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(i) Provisions for Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the Company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bond rates incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cashflows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

3. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Cont.)

(j) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount being normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(k) Adoption of new and revised accounting standards

The Company has adopted all standards which became effective for the first time at 30 June 2019, refer to Note 2 for details of the changes due to standards adopted.

(1) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgments and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgments, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events that management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgments and estimates will seldom equal and related actual results.

In the director's opinion, there are no particular estimates or assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities as of the balance sheet date.
